Clinical Team: Rapid Response: Chesterfield and North East Derbyshire

Base: The team cover the whole of North East Derbyshire and Chesterfield and have 3 bases – Clay Cross, Walton Hospital (Main triage service) and The Arc in Clowne.

Working hours/shift patterns: Our service covers the hours of 08:00 – 18:30 hrs, 7 days a week.



An overview of the service:

The nursing rapid response team visit patients in their own living environment to provide urgent nursing care in the community setting.

We see patients with a range of health needs including wound care, palliative and end of life care, medication administration who needs to be seen within 2 or 24hour of referral into our service. These patients are kept within the rapid response team for a maximum of 5 days or 3 visits.

We have a team of triage nurses who manage on average 200 requests per day; making vital decisions on responses in the community nursing service.

The service is fast paced and responsive in meeting the needs of the patients in our locality.

We work closely with our rapid response therapy team, the core nursing and therapy services and the PCN GP home visiting services within the community. We also cover community support beds within Derbyshire County







Council care homes in the locality, providing nursing and

therapy care. In addition to these services with have a Community Response Team who provide personal care and reablement to patients in their own home, the Rapid Response team work very closely with this service too.

Key Duties:

- To respond to the needs of the patient in a timely manner.
- To provide a holistic assessment of the needs of the patient / significant others involved in providing care.
- To make onward referrals if indicated i.e. therapy, GP, continuing care, core teams etc
- To manage own time management and workload

Clinical Team: Rapid Response, Derby City

Base: Florence Nightingale Community Hospital

Working hours/shift patterns: Shifts are 08.00- 18.30 Monday – Sunday, usually with combinations of these hours from 7.5 hrs to 10 hours worked per shift. There is the opportunity for nurses to work weekends and shift times can be discussed with supervisors and assessors.



An overview of the service:

Rapid Response Team is located within Florence Nightingale Community Hospital. The team is made up of Band 6 nurses, registered nurses, Band 3 and 4 HCAs and TNAs. We also have support from the clinical lead and integrated team leaders. The Rapid team focus is putting the patient in the right place at the right time to receive the right level of care, the allocation of appropriate resources to meet the patient's need.

There is a restaurant at London Road Community Hospital where staff discount is provided – hot and cold meals are available. There is a kitchen area where the team is based where hot drinks can be made, and a microwave is available. There are a few corner shops within walking distance, but we advise bringing your own food or purchasing this from the hospital.

There is car parking at the hospital and a car pass will be arranged when on rotation with us.

Nurses are required to wear uniform in line with the dress code.



Key duties of a Band 5 nurse:

- All aspects of patient care including assessing, planning, implementing and evaluating care.
- Supporting colleagues with supervision and assessment.
- To work the DCHS way to providing safe care and improve quality.

PHASE I:

- The majority of our referrals come from hospitals Sheffield Northern General Hospital (NGH), Chesterfield Royal Hospital (CRH), Nottingham and Derby Hospitals.
- Community referrals mainly come from the Heart Failure Specialist Nurses (HFSN) based in our office, GP surgeries and the angina management programme (AMP).
- We are not the only team who runs cardiac rehab around North Derbyshire. A programme runs at CRH for post MI patients only. Also Kingsmill hospital (Mansfield) and Bassetlaw (Worksop) hospitals run cardiac rehab in the east.
- As the CRH programme takes a lot of the MI patients our programme based in Chesterfield mainly concentrates on surgical and community referrals.

PHASE II:

- Every referral we receive gets a phone call to introduce our team, gain a basic history, to check on recovery post operation/hospital admission, to explain cardiac rehab, hopefully recruit to a programme and book into clinic.
- Prior to attending the rehab programme all patients are assessed at one of three clinics Ash green (Chesterfield), Bolsover Welbeck Surgery (Bolsover) and Cavendish hospital (Buxton).
- The aim of the clinics is to meet patients one-to-one prior to attending a programme, understand their cardiac and past medical history, to discuss cardiac rehab and complete a functional exercise test.





PHASE III:

- We run at three class locations: Queens Park Sport Centre (Chesterfield and North East Chesterfield), Clowne (for the Bolsover districts) and Buxton leisure centre (Buxton and high peaks)
- Rehab is a nine-week course once weekly.
- Once weekly exercise is either a circuit-based class with individualised levels of intensity to suit all abilities – mixing cardiovascular and muscular strength/endurance. Or a gym-based exercise class, for those who have been identified to be safe using the equipment – mixing cardiovascular and muscular strength/endurance.
- We also offer a home exercise programme for those who are unable to attend classes. This is done by utilising either a home exercise booklet, REACH-HF or BHF exercise DVD and a resistance band exercise programme. Followed up with weekly phone calls, offering either the education sessions to attend, or education over the phone with leaflets sent out to them.
- Throughout a patients exercise programme, they'll be invited to attend 1 education session, covering different topics.
- Digital education is also available with DCHST YouTube channel and virtual LLB session.

PHASE IV:

- There are lots of phase IV programmes available in the county, and we highly recommend patients continue on exercising at their local programme once rehab is complete. Booklets are given to each patient half-way through rehab to choose their preferred location.
- Depending on location there are a variety of options available including gym, circuit class, walking groups, support groups and tai chi.

Key duties of a Band 5 nurse: We only have Band 6 specialist nurses, but more recently have band 5 exercise professionals.

Band 6 nurse; to conduct initial assessments, including functional testing. Assist in class delivery and review patients' recovery (including medications / observations and risk factors). Deliver educational component to reduce patients risk of secondary events.

Band 5 exercise professional; Assist in class delivery, complete final assessments including functional testing. Monitor patients' progression and adapt exercise as necessary. Report any clinical concerns to B6 specialist for review. Deliver appropriate educational components to reduce patients risk of secondary events.

Team Profile

Clinical Team: Older People's Mental Health (Dementia)

Base: The Walton Unit, Walton Hospital, Whitecotes Lane, Chesterfield, S40 3HW

Working hours/shift patterns: We work various shifts:

- Long day: 07:00 21:00 with three x 30-minute breaks
- Early: 07:00 15:00 with 30 minutes break
- Late: 13:00 21:00 with 30 minutes break
- Nights: 20:45 07:15 with 30 minutes break



An overview of the service:

The Walton unit provides older peoples' mental health services. We provide a period of assessment and treatment to older people who have had a rapid deterioration in their mental health and need specialised care. Most of our patients have a formal diagnosis of dementia and are usually admitted under Section 2 of the Mental Health Act. Here at the Walton unit, we aim to provide holistic and person-centred care whilst maintaining our patients' dignity and always act upon their best interests.

Key duties of a Band 5 nurse:

- Ensure observation levels are appropriate and staffed, alter if required.
- Deal with any staff absences and refer to as appropriate to the manager.
- Organise staff breaks, help to cover staff breaks and support staff wellbeing.
- Check clinical observations have been taken and assess early warning scores and escalate or repeat as appropriate.
- Help serve patients lunch and monitor their intake.
- Assist HCAs in providing patient personal care, assess skin integrity and general presentation, record diet and fluid intake, obtain MSU samples etc, administer routine medication, task medics via computer if needed, order medication from pharmacy via medication, stock up







drug trolley and clean as needed, dispense medication

and administer appropriately, document on the handover if the patient has not accepted their medication, take routine blood sugars and escalate appropriately.

- Check diary for daily allocated tasks and action in a timely manner usually after 1pm handover.
- Ensure diet and fluids are up to date.
- Write up progress and evaluation and update throughout the shift if necessary.
- Admit /discharge patients as required.
- Check controlled drugs in and out of the register, follow up any discrepancies.
- Check clean clinical room temperature and escalate to pharmacy if out of range.
- Complete patient assessments and action referrals where necessary and appropriate.
- Update family on their relative's progress with assessment and treatment.
- Update positive behavioural support plans.
- Prepare ward round notes, attend ward round and carry out / delegate ward round tasks following ward round along with updating family.
- Escalate poorly patients appropriately, arrange patient escort and transport for emergency transfers to hospital, complete necessary paperwork and documentation.
